The Pine River Watershed - One Watershed One Plan

The Pine River Watershed, nestled in the heart of northern Minnesota's lake country, is characterized by clean water, healthy fish, abundant wildlife and diverse forests. These elements contribute to the economic significance of the area and are a magnet for tourism and development.

A watershed is defined as an area of land that contains a common set of streams, rivers and lakes that all drain into a larger body of water. The key word to remember regarding a watershed is connection. Everything is connected to everything else in the watershed. Highlights of our Pine River Watershed include:

- Contains over 500 lakes
- Rivers, lakes, and wetlands cover about a third of the surface of the watershed
- Supplies 15 million people with drinking water, from St. Cloud to Cairo, IL
- Covers 502,400 acres (785 square miles)
- Stretches through four counties: Cass, Crow Wing, Aikin and a small slice of Hubbard

Residents and visitors often feel a deep connection to the region and its natural resources because of the legacy of family cabins and vacations. This bond is reflected in the mission statement of the One Watershed One Plan:

Harmonizing people, water, forests, and the economy in a place to renew your spirit.


One Watershed, One Plan (1W1P) is at its core, a program designed to foster collaboration between upstream and downstream neighbors. It supports local governments, helping them develop targeted action plans to protect the watershed and guides them in creating regional partnerships. Through the 1W1P program, comprehensive watershed management plans are generated. These plans address water quality and quantity, groundwater, drinking water, habitat, recreation and other issues. The goal of 1W1P is to work with all types of landowners - from woodland to urban and agricultural to lakeshore - to protect the water and natural resources within the watershed.

Maintaining the quality of our waters has a cascade effect in our area. The above-average water quality within our watershed can in large part, be credited to the rich surrounding forested lands. Woodlands act as a sponge, filtering contaminants and retaining soil sediment, which in turn keeps our water clean.

Our Minnesota way of life is dependent on the quality of our waters. As a property owner, you can make a difference. For more information about the Pine River 1W1P, go to www. crowwing.us/1W1P.

The property also included a building that had been the Lodge's maintenance, laundry and cleaning area. We built a guest cabin where the maintenance building was located, and purchased the "pink cabin" in 1974.

The cabin is presently owned by Jeff Barker and family.

Fire Safety at Iowa Camp in the 1970s

In the late 1970s, I attended safety training at the annual Fire School in Wisconsin. The focus of the training was the use of hand-held fire extinguishers as containment tools while waiting for the firefighting professionals to arrive. I was so impressed with what could be accomplished with a twenty-pound extinguisher, that I contacted Lenny Lang and Gary Anderson of the Outing Fire Department and asked them if it might make sense to put some extinguishers throughout the old Washburn Lodge and Iowa Camp areas because of the density of cabins on that part of the peninsula. We thought the idea would work, so we purchased eight units and placed them throughout the cabins on the west side of Peninsula Road.

Unfortunately, before the placement of the eight units, one cabin was lost to fire during a severe thunderstorm and but for a brief downpour, we might have lost the entire peninsula to fire because of the drought conditions at the time.


Later, four more units were placed on the east side of the Peninsula Road and we supported the "dry well' proposed by the Outing Fire Department that was installed at Lake Margaret. We then considered purchasing three fire pump placements, two on the West Lake and one on East Lake. The pumps are identical and are mobile. A group of volunteers maintains these pumps. Thanks to Lenny Lang, Gary Anderson and all the volunteers who have helped.

Comments from Gary Anderson, April 2020

I remember the fire Ron refers to above. I was a member of the fire department at that time and helped fight the fire. It could easily have burned most of the buildings in Iowa Camp because they are so close together. I also remember Ron contacting us about purchasing the fire extinguishers and a floating water pump. Because of the support of the Lake Washburn Association we were able to install a Dry Hydrant on Margaret Lake.

Fisheries Report

For many, this was a frustrating winter. The ice that was so poorly formed over Washburn this year didn't leave until around April 22 - that's about average. Because of the uncertain and dangerous ice conditions much of the winter, snowmobile and ATV traffic on the lake was minimal, as were the number of fish houses. Then came COVID-19 which pretty much shut down the area and puts our eagerly awaited summer plans in some degree of jeopardy. Given all that, there is not much to report.

DNR FISHERY PLAN: Many DNR employees are currently working from home. At this point, no decisions have been made about the fishery management at the state level, and definitely nothing is being done that will lend direction in developing an individual lake plan for Washburn. Whether anything is done about that this year remains to be seen.

STOCKING: Because of COVID-19, the DNR does not expect to harvest walleye eggs this year and consequently, we do not expect stocking to be done until perhaps next year. Electrofishing may still be conducted in the fall but if so, it'll be just to determine the level of natural reproduction.

FISHERY VOLUNTEERS: A number of you indicated an interest in being on the Fishery Committee. Thank you for your willingness to help. At this time, no activities are planned. In fact, mine is primarily a liaison position between the Lake Washburn Association (LWA) and the DNR. From time to time, we may be asked to perform tasks to help the DNR manage our fishery, such as with the development of a fishery plan for the lake, but as noted above, that project is on hold for the near future. Once that is back up and running, I'll likely call on some of you for assistance. Until then, there are other roles within the LWA that could use your help.

LICENSES: You can still obtain fishing licenses and boat renewals. If you are reluctant to buy them in person or if your favorite vendor is closed, you can purchase your licenses online or by phone from the DNR as follows:



- Note: Boat renewals cannot be purchased by phone, only online.

BOAT LAUNCHING: At this time, it appears all public launch sites within Cass County are or will be open. Dock installation may be delayed however, so you might want to check this ahead of time.

FISHING/BOATING: The mandate from the governor's office requires maintaining a safe distance between people. That becomes difficult in a boat, especially if more than a couple of people are on board. If you do get out fishing or boating this year, try to stay safe. Remember, each person you are exposed to, exposes you to each person they have been exposed to.

As always, your angling reports are appreciated, regardless of your success.

Wake Awareness



Almost every motorboat can create a wake, which is why boaters must be aware of the danger wakes present and the damage they can do. While common courtesy dictates boaters should control their wakes, there are consequences beyond how wakes may affect people. So, what do boaters really need to know when it comes to owning their wake?

Under Minnesota law, the damage your wake causes are treated the same as damage caused by an actual collision. Personal watercraft (PWC) must stay at least 150 feet from shore. There is no required distance for boats, but by staying at least 200 feet from shore or other structures boaters can reduce the likelihood their wakes will cause damage.

Be aware of your environment and what's going on around you – this applies to everyone on and around the water.

- Have a designated lookout to keep an eye out for other boats, objects, and swimmers.
- If crossing a wake, cross at low speeds and keep a close lookout for skiers and tow-ables.
- Comply with all signs and respect barriers. This includes speed limits, no-wake zones, and underwater obstructions.

Stay at least 200 feet away from shorelines, docks or other structures. Backing a boat up to a riverbank or lakeshore can damage the area and lead to erosion. Travel slowly in shallow waters.

- Travel slowly in shallow waters and avoid boating in water less than 2½ feet deep. High speeds near shorelines lead to large wakes that cause shoreline erosion.
- Check local ordinances, restrictions, closures, and permit requirements for the body of water you are on.
- Ask permission from the landowner(s) before crossing private property.

Minimize repetitive passes. Once you've run a line, move on to another area. Comply with all signs and respect barriers.

Respect the rights of others so everyone can enjoy their time on the water – keep the noise down, be courteous to other boaters, and show consideration to all recreationists on and around the water.

Environmental impacts of wakes

Large wakes produced by watercraft can result in a variety of negative environmental consequences, including:

- Shoreline erosion;
- Impaired water quality resulting from increased sediment in the water;
- Loss of shoreline vegetation, which helps stabilize the shore and provides important habitat for fish and wildlife.

These impacts are greater when water levels are high, and shorelines are saturated.

Boaters must be aware that their actions directly impact the environment. They should take steps to reduce their wake when operating near shore or when water levels are high.

Get the Lead Out!

The DNR received a report on a loon that had not migrated. It was the day after Thanksgiving, and the lake was freezing. The loon was keeping a small hole open in the ice on Big Jay Gould Lake near Cohasset. Members of the Cohasset Fire Department used the "ice angel" air boat and wet suits to retrieve the loon. Early the next morning, the loon was taken to the Garrison Animal Hospital and was diagnosed with lead poisoning. An x-ray showed that a lead jig-head was in its stomach, and blood tests indicated a blood lead level of 2.28 parts per million (ppm). By the time the lead jig was removed, it was too late. The lead had already poisoned the bird. It died. Lead poisoning occurs in birds with blood levels greater than 0.2 ppm; they usually die with levels greater than 1.2 ppm.

Just one lead sinker can poison a loon

A loon with lead poisoning behaves strangely. It may fly poorly, have crash landings or stagger onto the ground. The loon begins to gasp, tremble, and its wings droop as lead is carried through its blood stream. As the poisoning worsens, it eats very little and hides among aquatic vegetation, staying behind when other birds migrate. It becomes emaciated and often dies within two or three weeks after swallowing the lead jig or sinker. It takes only one lead sinker or jig to poison a loon.

How poisoning happens

Loons routinely swallow pea-sized pebbles on the bottom of lakes. The pebbles pass to the stomach and help in digestion, like grit in the stomach of a chicken. When fishing sinkers are lost during fishing and drop to the bottom of the lake, they can be picked up by loons or by waterfowl like

ringneck ducks and trumpeter swans. Some loons also swallow fishing jigs when they mistake them for minnows. As the lead sinker or jig is exposed to the acids of the stomach and to other pebbles, lead enters the bird's system and slowly poisons the bird.

You can help

Give nontoxic sinkers a try. The less lead we release into the environment, the better off our wildlife will be. Next time you clean out your tackle box and make a list of replacement tackle to purchase for the upcoming fishing season, be sure to include nontoxic fishing sinkers. Currently there are



many non-toxic sinker alternatives on the market made out of bismuth, tin, stainless steel, tungsten, ceramic, recycled glass and natural granite. Because weights of the different materials vary, you'll have to experiment to find what works best for your type of fishing.

Ask your local bait and tackle store to stock environmentally friendly unleaded sinkers. Two examples are Gremlin Green and Bullet Weights. Some major discount stores have made a special effort to increase the variety and supply of non-lead sinkers. Never throw old tackle into the water or on shore. Consider lead sinkers and jigs as toxic material and dispose of them at household hazardous waste collection sites.

To ensure that future generations hear the call of the loon, we need to safeguard their environment. Even if you don't fish, share this information with family and friends who do. Just tell them to "Get the lead out!"

A conservation dilemma

In 2003 Minnesota's loon population was about 12,000 birds, and the numbers appear stable. There are, however, some potential threats to the long-term survival and status of loon populations. One of those is the threat posed by lead fishing sinkers and jigs.

The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency did a study to examine loons for high mercury concentrations. The mercury study incidentally discovered that loons were dying from lead poisoning. Out of 101 dead loons that were analyzed, a total of seven died of lead poisoning and an equal number died from fish line entanglement. The fish line problem is fairly straightforward and can be reduced by urging anglers to avoid disposing of waste fish line in our lakes. The lead poisoning problem is more complex.

Biologists have studied the effects of lead sinkers and jigs on water birds and birds of prey since the 1970s. In areas where loons breed, lead poisoning from sinkers or jigs may account for up to 50 percent of the dead adult loons found by researchers.

Here are two ways to dispose of the lead jigs and sinkers you find in your tackle box.

- They can be disposed of at a local hazardous waste facility (call first as hours are limited) or

2020 Lake Washburn Association Spring/Summer Membership Update

We appreciate your membership in the LWA!


The LWA relies on support from its members. And now it's even easier to keep your membership current when you become a "sustainer."

It's simple – as a sustainer, you fill out the membership form, including your credit card information, and your contribution will be automatically made to LWA each year in January, until you tell us differently in writing. Your sustaining membership provides the LWA with a dependable source of funds. This allows us to provide services that help keep Lake Washburn healthy and to support social activities for LWA membership. And being a sustaining member is easy for you too. No more worrying if you've renewed your membership, and no more annoying renewal reminders - your membership is always current!

A downside to processing donations using a credit card is that it costs the LWA 3.5% of the total donation. Credit cards are convenient, and the processing fees are a cost of doing business. While it is not a lot of money, it does come off the top and your donation is reduced by this percentage.

There has been a change in the membership form/invoice to address this. A check-box asking if you'd be willing to add 3.5% to your donation total to help cover this charge has been added below the credit card information area. This option is strictly voluntary, but will keep more of your donation working for the LWA. Remember, your entire donation is tax deductible.

Larry was involved with wild rice growers and Barb helped him organize the International Wild Rice Association.

Barb cared about our water and shorelines. She wanted future generations to enjoy what she had growing up on Lake Washburn. Her father, Glen Mechelke, still lives on the lake. We thank her son Scott, for sharing her stories of life on the lake.

Richard was remembered in our 2019 spring newsletter when he left Lake Washburn to enter nursing care at Sterling Point in Princeton. Richard was born on May 16, 1936, in Dayton, and died on Saturday, January 11, 2020, of Alzheimer's. He served in the Air Force as a boom operator on a KC-97 inflight refueler. If you visited him, he'd

tell you stories about those Strategic Air Command flights and the Cold War. He helped us write a section on water quality, wild life and forest management for the 100 Years on Lake Washburn book. If you called his home, the recorder would play: "I'm in the woods managing the forest and wild life." It was true. Richard enjoyed volunteering for the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources – Forest

Wildlife Populations and Research Group out of Grand Rapids. He assisted with the trapping and radio-collaring of whitetail deer, fishers and wolves, and worked with the interns, graduate students and biologists. He was active in Firearms Safety Training and a member of the Lions Club. He loved his 1969 Cessna 150. It was a sad day when he had to sell his plane. The dementia slowly took him from flying, fishing, managing his forest, and Canada fishing trips. He and Joan had five sons: Bryan died at 14, a tough time for them. Sons, Brad, Bruce, David and Cary follow in Richard's woodland footsteps.

Richard's gentle ways came from our parents, Clem and Leone. At his funeral gathering we were reminded - he had a big heart, was a kind man, and a good friend to many. Our parents taught us caring. 

In the last LWA newsletter, we mistakenly stated that the staff at the public landing on Lake Washburn were Department of Natural Resources (DNR) employees. While the DNR does train the inspectors who work at the landing, these inspectors are actually paid and managed by Cass County with support from the Crooked Lake Township AIS Committee.

We regret the error.

Minnesota Personal Watercraft Laws

You Must...

- Wear a USCG approved life jacket.
- Travel at slow-no wake speed (5 mph or less) within 150 feet of: non-motorized boats, shore (unless launching or landing skiers directly to or from open water), docks, swim rafts, swimmers or any moored or anchored boat.
- Operate only from 9:30 a.m. to 1 hour before sunset.
- Use the cutoff lanyard properly.
- Obey operator age/permit laws for those younger than 18 years old.

You May Not...

- Chase or harass wildlife.
- Jump the wake of another boat within 150 feet of the craft.
- Operate a personal watercraft in a manner that endangers life, limb or property.

Protect Your Sport

Respect your neighbors...don't operate for long periods in the same area or near occupied boats or shore.

This is only a summary of the laws as of January 2014 and is required to be visible to the operator on all personal watercraft in Minnesota. For more information contact:
